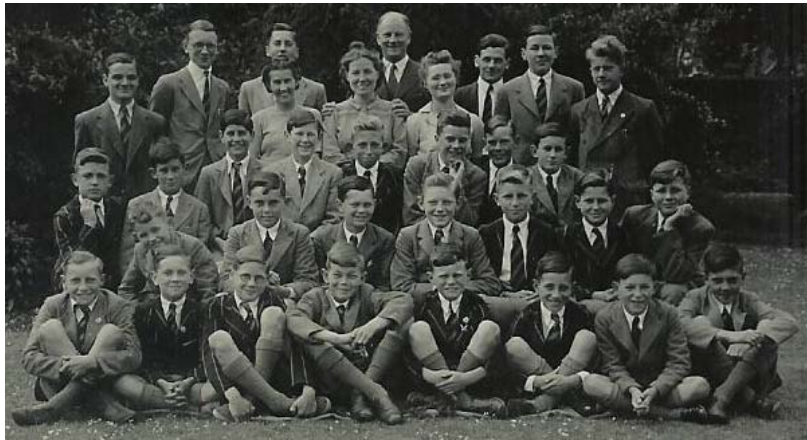

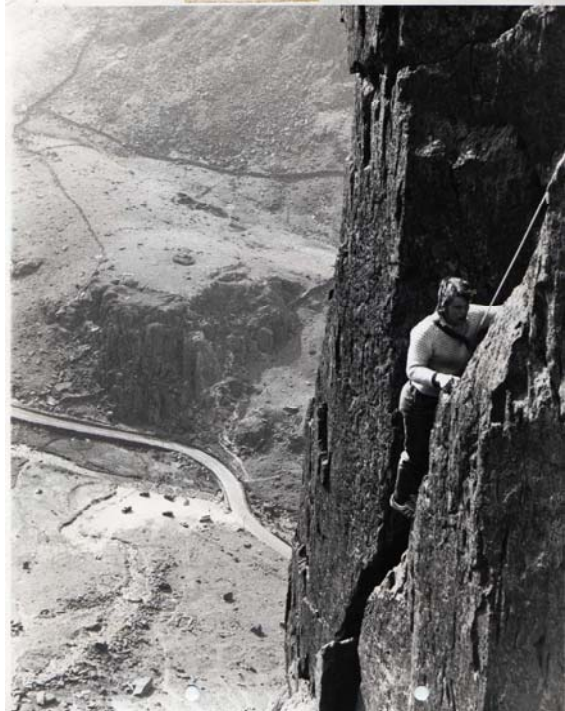
We are now up to about 28 genuine Southfielders but there are a great number still not accounted for. Could you please circulate the following text on the OH website or by whatever means you think appropriate.

On 12th May forty-four old friends met at Dorchester Rugby Club (22 from 1952, 16 from 1953 and 6 from 1954) along with thirty wives. Many had travelled a long way to be there, some staying overnight in the town including those who had flown in from America, Germany and Cyprus. Many of us had not met up since we left around 1959/1960 and after demolishing a splendid buffet we spent a delightful afternoon meeting wives, catching up on lives and careers and of course reminiscing. Amongst many stories there were tales of boys blowing down gas pipes to put out Bunsen burners in the Physics Lab, cabinets being propped open in the Chemistry Lab to ensure unspeakable smells escaped, latrines at

Army camps (don't ask!) and identification of those boys who gathered for a crafty cigarette behind the rifle range.

Two wore their old school caps and at least one old school tie was proudly worn. A 1959 Athletics Day programme was

I have recently been appointed as Industry Partnership Development Manager at The Thomas Hardy School following a career combining scientific research for the Centre for Ecology & Hydrology in Dorset with science in society outreach and schools/student liaison roles.

My association with Thomas Hardy School dates back to the year in which the Dorchester upper schools joined forces and my eldest of my three children arrived at Portocabin city; they all benefited from an excellent education! Over the intervening years, many incredible changes have taken place and I had the pleasure of working with many students and teachers from this school on various productive scientific initiatives whilst at CEH. This post offers me a great opportunity and challenge to build on existing partnerships and to develop new ones designed to enhance the Science College. CRICKET MATCH - CLUB v THE SCHOOL from Colin LUCAS

For the first time, that I can recall, the annual cricket match Club versus the School was abandoned at tea due to the inclement weather prevailing at that time. It was not our decision but that of the groundsman who had to consider other matches to be played later that week. However the match was commenced. The Club batted first and a very solid start was made by the openers Lee Ames (21) & Peter Moxom (27) against some good and spirited bowling by the School. Lee Ames was first to be dismissed LBW to G Stickland, having seen off the opening attack of Mitchem and King. Peter Moxom followed being caught deep in the field after hooking a good delivery from Kellaway.

Richards & Bennett added 15 or so runs when a sharp shower halted the proceedings, and tea was taken. After tea more rain!!! It must be said that the general opinion was that this was the best school side the club had opposed in recent years, the fielding was certainly the best by far for many years. The talent of the 'Old Boys' was well contained and perhaps the rain did the Club side a good turn. It was discovered later that the school side was the team going to the West Indies in October.

FROM THE HEADTEACHER

Hardyean's may have already heard that I will be leaving the school at the end of this academic year. After twenty years I believe that both I and the school are ready for a new challenge. I am quite sure that Hardyean's will play a part in the next phase of development and success.

There is a substantial period of time before my departure and I trust there will be an opportunity to say goodbye to those who have been so instrumental in connecting the Club to the school and offering both remarkable and consistent support. In the meantime life and the school goes on.

Results this year were as good as ever and our GCSE and A Level results were 28th and 48th respectively in The Guardian league table of Comprehensive Schools.

At A Level these were our best results ever with an A – C pass rate of 77.1%, 4.3% above the national average. Once again Mathematics led the way with 50 A grades. This is a remarkable result and certainly bucks the trend in terms of national expectations and outcomes. Similar levels of quality were achieved in Electronics, Physics, Chemistry and English.

Our 5A* - C GCSE pass rate was 79%, a decline of 2% from 2006. There were 140 A*/A grades in Mathematics and similar numbers in History and English Literature. Our drop of 2% is no cause for alarm and looking into the crystal ball I am reasonably confident in predicting a figure of 83%+ next year which would be a very pleasing outcome.

Students in both the sixth form and Year 11 figured in the top 5 results in the country. Two female students gained top five marks in Politics and eighteen students in Year 11 gained similar accolades in English, Mathematics or Religious Education. For the first time a group of student undertook French GCSE a year early – a high ability group – six of them achieved the top mark in the UK – hence my optimism regarding our results next year.

A satisfactory if not spectacular (in our terms) set of results. Well above national averages of course, but we will do much better this year.

The new year has started well, the new sports hall and resources centre are about to open, both would grace any institution and we look forward to the new swimming pool. We have 2350 students – a record – and a positive view of the future.

As ever I thank you for your support and interest in the school.
