Although I had heard of their demise, I was naturally saddened to read about the deaths of Geoff Hutchings and Chris Etherington, two of my contemporaries at Hardyes in the 1950s.

Geoff Hutchings and I were born on the same day in Dorchester Hospital and were in the same classes at Dorchester Primary School for Boys and Hardyes — although it was still Dorchester Grammar School when we first went into Wollaston House with 'The Duchess' as our form teacher.

It was Geoff who got me my first detention. Miss Hill was very proud of the fact that no one in 2A ever had a detention — but I did; and all because in one of her lessons Geoff bet me I couldn't write The Lord's Prayer on the back of a normal postage stamp. He won: I was caught halfway through.

My wife and I went to Singapore in 1963 to teach in schools for servicemen's children (staying there for six years and another six in what used to be called BAOR, where I won my first headship). While in Singapore the Nottingham Playhouse came out to put on three plays and amongst the cast was Geoff. We took him out for a meal and enjoyed reminiscing about the good old days.

The last time I saw him was backstage at the Royal Shakespeare Theatre at Stratford. After the performance in which he starred we went around to the stage door to say hello; he appeared in only a pair of Y-fronts!



I have attached two rather grainy pictures from one of the CCF camps, at Bourley in 1955. This was the one where we were treated to a demonstration of an A-bomb attack: from ringside seats on an embankment we watched as a plane 'dropped' a bomb near a long line of soldiers. They all fell over, displaying the other side of their bodies, which were red and raw. Perhaps this gave Geoff the taste for makeup before he took part in a number of Hardyes' productions. The pictures show us larking about in between tasks. Geoff acts as quartermaster, doling out plates for one of our Bourley meals — remember the three huge vats ordering us to "Wash", "Rinse" and "Sterilise"? — ably assisted by Dick Cleall.

In the other picture Chris Etherington, who always looked as if he would become an officer, is saluting Kingman as he receives (or hands over) some sacred object. Dick Cleall is there once again, to add weight to the occasion, and a number of other contemporaries whose names escape me for the moment take part in the ceremony. I hope you are able to find space in the next newsletter to reproduce these pictures: they'll stir a lot of memories from the Class of '57 who had such a great education and time at the school.

It is pleasing to read in the newsletter of the success of Hardyeans at gaining places at Oxford University. Whilst numbers seem to be much greater than those of 20 or so years ago, I am reminded occasionally of the fact that, in the 1950s, Hardyeans were present in Oxford in sufficient numbers to have their own club, complete with an annual dinner in Exeter College, to which the headmaster, Mr R. W. Hill and one or two other members of staff were invited. I have no idea when the club ceased to exist, but I still have a few photographs, a menu or two and a club tie as evidence. The seventh annual dinner was held in 1958.

This history and the success of the Hardyeans London dinner makes me wonder whether a lunch or dinner in Exeter College, Oxford, primarily, but not necessarily exclusively, for Oxford graduates and their invited guests would be of interest to Hardyeans. As for other Club functions, ladies would be welcomed. I have, in recent years, organised two lunches in Exeter College and, based on that experience, believe that the options would be lunch or dinner. I have found that the College has been less occupied with conferences and so on towards the end of September. The weather then is usually still reasonable. If dinner were chosen, there would probably be the option of staying overnight in College, with breakfast (not cheap.)

If you are interested in the possibility of attending a lunch or dinner in Exeter College, Oxford, probably in September 2011, please communicate before the deadline for the next newsletter, giving as much of the requested information as you can.

Which is preferred? Lunch or dinner?

Would you attend either, according to which is more popular by first choice?

Week day or Saturday?

How many persons?

The format would probably be a drinks reception in the Fellows garden or the Rector's Lodging and garden followed by lunch or dinner in Hall or (if numbers are small) in the Rector's Lodging or in another College room. An overnight stay in College is possible. Please note that parking a car in Oxford is difficult.

At this stage, I am attempting to discover whether this idea is worth pursuing, if there appears to be sufficient interest, I hope to be able to provide details and a booking form in the next newsletter. Any suggestions which are relevant will be welcomed.

The newsletter reminds me that I have not seen a report of the death of **Bob Garrett**. I was informed of this fact, a few years ago, by his wife, having sent a Christmas card. Bob was a close friend for the few years that we were at school together, I did not arrive until 1948, when I joined Walter Lancashire's fourth form and I discovered that Bob lived at Lower Waterston (where his father ran a small farm) and was church organist at Piddlehinton. I lived in Piddletrenthide. Bob did not excel at school, but was very practical. He spent much of his spare time at a garage in Puddletown and it was no surprise that, when he left school in 1950, he joined motor engineers whose premises were at the Southern end of Trinity Street. The name escapes me. [*Tilleys possibly, Editor*]

I lost touch with Bob until a few years ago when he suddenly made contact. He had, quite fortuitously, met Peter Lewenden who passed on my address and we met after one of the Club Christmas lunches at the Wessex hotel. Bob had established a small business performing electrical testing and seemed both happy and successful. Retirement was close at hand. Then he told me that he was ill, and we were not to meet again.

I realise that this all sounds a little imprecise; nevertheless there may be those who remember Bob and would appreciate a brief note of his passing.

I was pleased to read the letter from **Philip Swindells** in the last newsletter. He will undoubtedly remember the Oxford Club and the annual dinners there, I send my congratulations on his marriage.
