ANNUAL CRICKET MATCH - Club v The School - 13th July-

OLD HARDYEANS WIN AT CRICKET AGAINST THE SCHOOL- AGAIN! by Colin Lucas

The Old Hardyeans won the annual cricket match against the Thomas Hardye School by 24 runs in the usual 30 over match.

First to bat, the old boys were uncertain as to how the wicket would perform. This caused openers Simon Joslin and Peter Moxom to exercise a certain amount of caution. A sure and steady start took the score along to 27, before the loss of the first wicket. A slick catch by Nick Burgess sent Simon Joslin back to the players area- no pavilion!- having scored only nine runs.

Pete Moxom was joined at the crease by Dan Belt and together they consolidated the score to 63, before Moxom was clean bowled by Rob Baney for 39.

Belt was joined by Tony Foot who, whilst spending three or four overs at the crease, only contributed one run. However Belt continued to plunder the School's bowling and was finally caught at mid on having contributed 30 runs, including five boundaries.

Josh Foot and Martin Richards continued to thrash the tiring School bowlers, who were unable to penetrate the attack by the old boys, who took the score to 163, Foot ending with 33 and Richards 35 not out. A goodly target for the School to chase.

It is interesting to note that Tony Foot, the old boys' Sports Officer has played for the side continuously since 1976. Two games were rained-off, so he has played 33 times for the Old Hardyeans against the School. This has to be a record - well done Tony!

Captain Tony Foot, aware the School side were endowed with some considerable batting talent, knew they were to be treated with respect. He decided to open the bowling with wily veteran David Trotter and Don Floyd. The success of that decision was reflected in Trotter bowling six overs, four of which were maidens and conceding only 12 runs in a commendable performance, very ably supported by Don Floyd who took 2 for 20 in six overs. A very satisfactory start. Although Cameron Armfield [14] and Henry Lewis [16] made valid contributions, the School side did not look

comfortable at 46 for 3. The innings needed some stability and this was provided by Marcus Evans and Steve Tucker, who put on 53 runs for the fourth wicket partnership.

At this point the match was finely balanced. Astute captaincy brought on Pete Moxom, whose second over was a wicket maiden. He was well supported by Dan Belt. Both bowled six overs- Moxom 4 for 17, Belt 1 for 24. This was enough to see the Old Hardyeans XI safely home, with the Thomas Hardye School all out for 143.

Umpires Geraint Hughes and the evergreen Frank Dike conducted the match with the decorum it deserved. The School XI showed much promise and could well be a side to be reckoned with next year.

Many thanks indeed for another very interesting Newsletter.

I was specially interested in the second entry about the Oxford dinner. I do not have a written record, but the paper work which I did towards a dinner for old Grammarians (as we still were) must have been in 1977 or 1978. I think the latter is more probable because I was certainly not asked to take any part in a second such dinner before I went down to earn a civilian living.

I have written " the paper work" because I can't remember who first suggested the idea. The dinner was not held in a college but in a restaurant run by a man who had been a scout in University so was well known to, and often visited by, University men. The attendance must have been small. Of course we invited HM who came and also Michael Newte who, so far as we could remember, was the only other Oxford graduate who taught us immediately before the war when he was called up. He was not able to come.

It's very pleasing to know that Alf Barrett is going strong at 90. You will not be able to say that of me for another three years. But my ultimate challenge (which I do not expect to achieve) is to beat my aunt who slipped gently away at 104. When we left her 100th birthday party she said "See you in 10 years" - but she didn't manage it.

Incidentally I also went to the school in 1932 - but not in South Street. The school was by then about 100 yards in a straight line from where we lived in Culliford Road.

Peter was the son of Gordon Barrett whose father founded the business of Barrett & Son . The Son being Gordon Barrett. They were Antique & Picture restorers with a shop in South Street and workshops in Charles Street they also became the leading Glass Merchants in Dorchester.

Peter was born whilst the family were living in South Court Avenue (later to move to Maiden Castle Road) on 2nd February 1946. He was educated at The Dorchester Boys Junior School and then Hardyes School. A noted apple scrumper !! Maths, Science and Latin were his favour subjects. He loved hockey but hated cricket after front teeth knocked out !

On leaving school joined Henry Duke & Son Surveyors and Estate Agents as an Articled Pupil. Married Judy in 1971 and moved to Langton Herring.

Following the take-over of Hy Duke & Son Peter became a victim of redundancy in 1992. He injured his back shortly after this and became increasingly unwell from then on. He was forced to give up golf, a sport he loved.. He took an increasingly active roll in village life. The Parish Council in particular. His greatest claim to fame was persuading people to part with huge sums of money at the produce show each year. A pillar of his community sadly missed by his wife Judy and two sons Christopher & Nicholas.

I've just been trawling the web re: my father in law George Russell Wheeler BSc MM OBE and came across your obit for him from 2002. I realise it is now almost 10 years since his death but I would like to correct a couple of things: Julia his daughter is Rev. Prof. Julia Davies not Davis.

George and his companion George Sim(m)s of the 13th Foot were never captured and he made this point to King George VI when receiving his MM. They both evaded capture throughout and return to the UK sometime in April 1942, as I recall.

You may also like to know that I am in process of developing a website <u>www.godolophins.org.uk</u> in which I shall be placing his written report on the evasion, or rather part of it, plus images (including some at Hardy's I think) and, hopefully, extracts from the recording he made with a rep of the IWMuseum a year or two before his death. His wife's extended family had two VCs and some five or so MCs and her brother was Major Kenneth Archibald Holland, a long time well known and much respected resident of Dorchester. Extract from NL no 87 Spring 2002 referred to by Graham Davies

George Russell WHEELER (1927-35) died in April 2002, aged 85

as reported in the Dorset Evening Echo of 24th April, George Wheeler was a survivor (mentioned in dispatches) of the St Nazaire raid in 1942, captured by the Germans but managed to escape with Canadian commando colleague George Simms from occupied France, both being later awarded the Military Medal. He spent time after the war in Malaya and was made an OBE in 1967 for his work as secretary of the central electricity board there. He retired in 1967 to Corfe Castle, and moved to West Lulworth 15 years ago. His wife Madeline died 10 years ago and their daughter Julia Davis is a professor at Lancaster University. The Funeral was due to be held at Holy Trinity Church, West Lulworth on 25th April.

The Editor is pleased to receive corrigenda and addenda to information supplied to the Newsletter. It has been noted that an error crept in to the report of Alf Barrett's 90th Birthday in the last issue. Alf was of course not at the school in South Street in 1932 but at the, then new, Barnes Way site.
