The President Writes:

From his *Christmas Luncheon* address, looking back on 2013....

.....Of course, the major blow to the Club was the death, at the end of August, of our Chairman, Colin Lucas. The fact that St. Peter's Church was full to capacity for Colin's memorial service was a fitting tribute to him, not only as a person, but also to his devotion to the Hardyans Club, The Hardyans Club Charitable Trust, and to the many other organisations with which he was actively connected.

The activities of our Club continue, under the leadership of our new Chairman, Godfrey Lancashire, his connections with the school going back to 1958, when, like me, he joined Hardye's, at Wollaston House. Many remember Godfrey's father, Walter Lancashire, House Master of Southfields and all his tremendous contribution to the activities of our school. Back in March we welcomed Sir Roger Gale, MP, as our guest speaker, at the Annual Dinner and in July the annual Cricket Match between the school and the club took place, at the School, Heather and I being the only representatives from the Club, as spectators. Sadly, declining numbers attending the Hardyans Club monthly luncheons, at the King's Arms has resulted, on a number of occasions, of Heather and me being the only participants, resulting in the embarrassing situation of the restaurant manager removing the table that would have been used by other members attending. Let's hope the trend will be reversed.

On a positive note, The Hardyans Club Charitable Trust, has been busy in its important role of providing financial bursaries to THS students. At the May meeting of The Trust, your president much enjoyed meeting students and hearing of their aspirations for the future. There were some very positive young people who came before us.

On Monday November 11, because of the rain and damp weather, the decision was taken that the main body of students of the school should not attend the Remembrance Ceremony at the Memorial Gates. However, there was a good turn out from the Sixth Form, and the CCF gave a very good account of itself for the occasion. We were delighted to welcome the Mayor of Dorchester, Councillor Stella Jones, at the Ceremony. During the ceremony, images crossed my mind of the British Tommy, in the rain, in France, in the 14 – 18 War, and I recalled the comment someone made to me a few years ago that he disliked the use of umbrellas by members of the public attending, when it rained at Remembrance Day Ceremonies.

Looking ahead, we look forward to welcoming, as Guest Speaker at the 2014 Annual Dinner, the Chairman of the THS Governors, Garry Batt, who is an auctioneer at Dukes, in Dorchester, guaranteed to be a very entertaining speaker. We are breaking new ground with the 2015 Annual Dinner, when we welcome the first female speaker, namely The Reverend Vicky Thurtell, Vicar of St. Peter's Dorchester, who was Head Girl of The Green School.

In conclusion, your President would like to put on record warmest thanks for all the hard work and devotion to the Club by the Club Council and the Trust, the tremendous support from the School, and for the ongoing response and support from our membership.

THOMAS HARDYE SCHOOL ACT OF REMEMBRANCE TRUNCATED BY RAIN, BUT GOES AHEAD

The Act of Remembrance in front of the Thomas Hardye School memorial gates in Queens Avenue, Dorchester, honouring those Old Grammarians and Old Hardyeans who gave their lives in armed conflict, went ahead at 11am on 11 November, despite steady rain. The tradition began in 1957 at Hardye's School and has continued at the modern Thomas Hardye School

Normally, over 2,000 students and 200 staff stand in front of the Memorial Gates, but in view of the weather, Head Teacher Michael Foley made the decision to truncate the numbers involved to the sixth form and representatives of all other years.

The names of all Old Hardyeans and Old Grammarians who fell in successive wars were read by four students- Imogen Carter, Max Luck, Aishlen Fields and Jack Purselove. Head Teacher Michael Foley led the minute's silence and the brief Act of Remembrance, culminating in the last post sounded by bugler Joe Brindley. Henry Love read the Kohima Declaration. *[cont'd p3]*

The corps of drums paraded in front of the School's Memorial Gates, with detachments from the Army and RAF Combined Cadet Force.

Among guests at the ceremony were the Mayor of Dorchester, Coun. Stella Jones and the Vicar of St. Peter's Church, Rev. Vicky Thurtell. President Peter Foster led 16 Old Hardyans, including the new Chairman Godfrey Lancashire, Secretary Michel Hooper-Immins and Treasurer Alan Brown.

Thomas Hardy School is thought to be the only school in the South and South West to maintain this respectful tradition, where students and staff stand silently in front of the Memorial Gates. It began when the stone pillars and iron gates were consecrated in 1957 at Hardy's School in Culliford Road. The Memorial Gates and pillars were rescued from the old school in 1995, before it was demolished and re-erected outside the new Thomas Hardy's School at the end of Queens Avenue, complete with the twin stone wyverns- the School's historic symbol- carved by the late Ken Batty, art master for many years. "This memorial to those whose names are inscribed on the Rolls of Honour was erected by the old boys, parents and Governors. Dedicated 18 July 1957." Inside the new School are two rolls of honour, one for Old Grammarians who fell in the Great War and the other honouring those in subsequent conflicts from 1939.

John Newman 1934 – 2013 from Roger Newman

Sadly, I have to report that my Brother **John Newman** who attended Dorchester School from 1945 to 1952 – has passed away. He was a boarder at Southfield.

He died peacefully at his home near Johannesburg in South Africa on 17th June, having suffered a severe stroke in 2003 that had left him with paralysed limbs on his left side. He never complained about his misfortune.

After leaving school he graduated at Southampton University as a Bachelor of Science and took up his first appointment in the British Cameroons.

He enjoyed Africa so much that he decided to seek permanent employment there, firstly in South Africa and later in Rhodesia where he met his wife Barbara.

After many enjoyable years living with his family in Southern Rhodesia he decided it would be wise to sell up and move back to South Africa where he joined the South African branch of Cadbury Ltd as chief chemist.

He made the decision to leave Rhodesia after the Mugabe era began, because he could see that Mugabe's policies would eventually ruin the country.

Throughout the 10 years of his disablement, Barbara cared for him at their home in the Transvaal that is quite close to the homes of their own three children and nine grandchildren.
