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THOMAS HARDYE SCHOOL ACT OF REMEMBRANCE PAYS TRIBUTE TO FALLEN OLD BOYS

With forecasts of heavy rain imminent, the Act of Remembrance on the morning of 11 November was attended by a representative gathering of staff and students, in silent tribute in front of The Thomas Hardye School memorial gates in Queens Avenue, Dorchester. Head Teacher Michael Foley led the minute's silence and a brief Act of Remembrance, culminating in the last post sounded by the bugler. Two detachments of the Combined Cadet Corps were on parade. Councillor Peter Mann, Mayor of Dorchester, attended the occasion.

Names of all Old Grammarians and Hardyans who gave their lives in armed conflict were read - particularly relevant on the centenary of the start of the Great War.

The tradition began in 1957 at Hardye's School and has continued at the modern Thomas Hardye School.

Around 30 old boys from the former schools were at the commemoration, led by President Peter Foster, who laid a wreath.

"It was 54 years ago - in 1960 - that I attended my first Act of Remembrance outside those handsome iron gates and the stone pillars with the wyverns on top, then in Culliford Road," reminisces Hardyans' Club Secretary Michel Hooper-Immins. "I recall it snowed that day in November 1960 and we all got very cold! It makes me and all the other old boys very proud that today's young students still remember the sacrifice of former students lost in action and in such a dignified manner."

Thomas Hardye School is thought to be the only school in the South and South West to maintain this respectful tradition. It began when the stone pillars and iron gates were consecrated in 1957 at Hardye's School in Culliford Road. The Memorial Gates and pillars were rescued from the old school in 1995, before it was demolished, and re-erected outside the new Thomas Hardye's School at the end of Queens Avenue, complete with the twin stone wyverns - the School's historic symbol - carved by the late Ken Batty, art master for many years.

The pillar alongside the memorial gates reads: "This memorial to those whose names are inscribed on the Rolls of Honour was erected by the old boys, parents and Governors. Dedicated 18 July 1957." Inside the new School are two rolls of honour, one for Old Grammarians who fell in the Great War and the other honouring those in subsequent conflicts from 1939.

From the Headteacher



A belated Happy New Year to all Old Hardyeans wherever you happen to be reading the latest newsletter. We are well into the academic year and for those students taking public examinations, Christmas marked the half-way point!

Shortly before the end of term we received our exams analysis for 2014 which is produced by Ofsted. Our GCSE results place us within the top 6% of schools nationally and the top 10% for A Level - by far the best performance in Dorset. At the time of writing, 10 students have been offered conditional places at Oxbridge for 2015 so the long tradition for academic excellence continues.

The new sports centre (phase VI) was due for completion by now but we have been beset by one delay after another and the latest date for handover is early March. However, it is a magnificent facility and the wait will be worth it. The new colleges (Henning, Trenchard, Napier and Stratford) are developing extremely well; we are particularly pleased with the enthusiasm youngsters have shown for the various sports competitions and the large numbers turning up to spectate. Music is another strength and anyone who attended the Christmas service at St Peter's or the concert with Imperial College, will testify to the quality. We are particularly indebted to one of our teachers, Peter Oakes, who is a superb choirmaster and brings a professionalism to our performances that is rarely seen in any school choir. We are looking to bring on other young musicians through DASP music so that the orchestra continues to thrive in the years ahead and we are always on the lookout for talent in those minority instruments that are expensive to learn and expensive to buy. I look forward to seeing many of you at the Annual Dinner, but in the meantime my very best wishes for 2015.
