

The New President of the Hardyeans' Club



Damien Lewis is a number one bestselling author whose books have been translated into over forty languages worldwide. For decades he worked as a war and conflict reporter for the world's major broadcasters, reporting from across Africa, South America, the Middle and Far East, winning numerous awards. His books include the WWII classics Churchill's Secret Warriors, Hunting The Nazi Bomb, SAS Ghost Patrol, SAS Italian Job, SAS Band of Brothers and Churchill's Great Escapes. A dozen of his books have been made, or are being made, into movies or TV drama series and have been adapted as plays for the stage. He raises considerable support and funds for charitable concerns connected with his writing.

Lewis is a Fellow of The Royal Geographical Society and the Winston Churchill Memorial Trust. He is a Founder Member of the Irish Film and Television Agency (IFTA) and The Frontline Club. He is a member of the Society of Authors, the National Union of Journalists, the Director's Guild of Great Britain, the Victory Services Club, the Royal Overseas League and 21 SAS Artist's Rifles Clubhouse. He is also Patron to several charities related to his writing. He talks widely to audiences about his work, including the Theatre Royal Bath, the National Army Museum, The Royal Geographical Society, and Speakers Festivals worldwide.

Guest Speaker for the 2023 Annual Dinner – Dr Daniel Lock

Daniel grew up in Dorchester, attending Thomas Hardye School from 1993-1998. After finishing at Thomas Hardye, he moved to Cardiff to study Sport Development while on a scholarship to represent Cardiff Metroplitan University at football. After completing his Masters degree and playing football in the League of Wales, Daniel moved to Sydney, Australia. During this time, he played football in the New South Wales Premier League, while studying towards a Doctorate in Management at the University of Technology, Sydney. After completing his doctorate, Daniel moved to Brisbane and lectured at Griffith University for 5-years, before returning to the UK. He is currently Deputy Head of the Department of Sport and Event Management at Bournemouth University. Daniel also sits on the Board of Trustees for Active Dorset, working to reduce levels of inactivity in the county.

Dear Hardyeans,

Firstly, thank you to all Hardyeans who were able to support Chris King in fundraising for a place on the Florida Science Trip. Chris, who is in Year 12, has a place in the school's physical disability base, and is a wheelchair user. The Florida Science Trip, running for the first time since lockdown, is an amazing opportunity for all students who go, taking in the Kennedy Space Centre, the Everglades, Bush Gardens and the odd theme park. To create an itinerary for Chris was costly, seemingly prohibitively so – until the call went round to the Hardyeans, whose generosity meant the total was reached in a matter of days. I know Chris will want to write something for this newsletter next autumn about the trip, but I must tell you how thrilled he and his family were by your kindness.

The school's sports teams have been as busy as always, playing over 70 fixtures so far this academic year. The Year 10 Boys Rugby team have recently qualified for the quarter finals of the National Schools Vase Cup Competition, and the Year 9 and Year 11 Girls Netball teams have swept all before them in winning their area tournaments, with the Year 11s finishing a best ever 3rd in the county tournament.

In other sports, we have our Equestrian Team win their jumping class to qualify for the National Championships later on in the year, and we have had X-County Running success at the last three meets – let's hope the frost stays away for the upcoming fixtures!

As I write, the Head of Sixth Form has just sent me a message confirming that ten of our students have received offers to

study at Oxford and Cambridge, with several more students waiting to hear about applications to study medicine. Congratulations to all of them – and many thanks to all of you who give so generously of your time and expertise preparing students with mock interviews.



Finally, can I say how much I am looking forward to the Hardyeans' Dinner in March, another much missed event which resumes for the first time since the pandemic. It is already very clear to me what a vibrant group the Hardyeans are, and I hope to meet many more of you in person at that event.

Information required! John Clegg has been in touch concerning his father John Armitage CLEGG who was at the Grammar School between 1936 and '44. John writes: 'my late father – John Armitage Clegg – attended Dorchester Grammar School as a boarder during the second World War leaving in 1944 aged 16 to work for Jackson Stops & Staff in Yeovil. The family lived at Hooke, Dorset where his mother was the headteacher at the village school. I believe he attended a few meetings of your organisation in later years although he did not find many contemporaries! The Clegg family had moved from Somerset to Buckinghamshire in 1962 with two of his sons, including myself, still living there.

The purpose of my note is to see if you could kindly point me towards any information on the school in my father's time there or any records mentioning my father.'

I was actually in Southfield House (with Godfrey Lancashire) from 1950 to 1957. I left Loughborough in 1971 to come to South Wales, where I have lived ever since.


There are a number of points in that Newsletter that ring bells for me. I also remember John Dutot's performance in "The Zeal of thy House", though the part I remember was his storming exit on the line: "Lest without me the very skies should fall!" I also remember the production of "Journey'sEnd" mentioned. Bill Caselton is a familiar name as a contemporary, and I was interested to discover that Sir Roger Gale MP is the Gale who overlapped with me at school. I had often wondered. I seem to remember he was involved in a production of "St Joan" that took place the year after I left. Jimmy Whittaker, Bert Cruse, "Dunc" Lidbury, Ticker Cole, "Boat" Stevenson, Sam Fox ("Some mothers do 'ave 'em. It's a wonder to me why they rear them.") and Ralph Hill are all names that I remember fondly.

For the record I have been happily married for nearly 59 years, and have a large family (12), ten of whom are long-term foster children. I am still active as a Local Preacher in the Methodist Church and one of my daughters is a minister in the church in Lancashire. In 2019 my wife and I had the privilege of attending a Buckingham Palace Garden Party as I had been Chair and Treasurer for ten years of a small local charity.

Around and about the Thomas Hardye School

Remembrance Ceremony Friday 11th November 2022

The School memorial gates provided an impressive background to the annual Remembrance Ceremony, which the School observes each Armistice Anniversary, the 11th Hour of the 11th Day of the 11th Month.

A very large turnout of students, one of the largest I've yet seen, was present to hear the names of past students who had given their lives in two world wars, and acknowledgments to those not named, from other schools in the locality. As the notes of the Last Post from the bugler died on the autumn air, the most intense of silences

followed, immaculately kept by the students and all present. Reveille sounded and wreaths of Flanders poppies were laid at the Memorial Gates.

The Hardyeans' Club wreath was laid by the Club's President Godfrey Lancashire. The wreaths formed a line of red, expressing the visual, emotional spectacle of Remembrance. The traditional military drill, associated with Remembrance was provided by the Army and RAF sections of the THS CCF.
